Humans in Control of AI



AI Prompting 101

- Prompting AI is different than conducting a Google search
- Effective searches are short, concise and cast a wide net
- Effective prompts describe clearly and specifically what you want the LLM to produce

AI Prompting 102

1. Define the role you want the AI to assume
 - Begin your prompt with “You are a master occupational therapist”
2. Define the task you want the AI to complete
 - “Create a choice board that helps students work on their pincher grasp.”
3. Add important details to make sure that you get the results you want
 - “The choice board should allow for a wide variety of fine motor activities. Materials available include crayons, markers, playdough, clothespins, and string.”

Remember that you are having a conversation and can ask for revisions to your results
